

As churches and ministry networks across the US continue to "re-open" and rebound following an unprecedented year of COVID, have you thought recently about how the coronavirus pandemic is still affecting our missionaries?

Many of these "heroes" are well acquainted with isolation, shortages, fear and uncertainty. But that doesn't make always make facing these challenges easier. Consider these five ways to pray for missionaries.

#### 1. Pray for those who've stayed on the field.

In 2020, the US State Department advised Americans to return to the US or prepare to remain where they are indefinitely, which means many are stayed in the countries that have become home to them. Pray they have what they need to stay safe and healthy when outside help is unavailable.

#### 2. Pray for missionaries who returned to the US.

With borders and airlines shutting down, missionaries felt they had no choice but to leave their countries of service quickly, long before they had planned to travel. They were unable to say goodbyes or make careful arrangements. Most (if not all) had to put treasured dreams and plans on hold. Pray for these workers and others feeling grief and loss.

#### 3. Pray for those navigating new travel and visa restrictions.

Lift up international missionaries with visas requiring them to exit their countries of service at regular intervals. Every hour new restrictions are put in place that could make it impossible for them to leave the country or be stranded in another country. While the height of the drama seems to be past, we can expect restrictions to continue changing in coming months. Many are living with heightened uncertainty in this area.

## 4. Ask God to guide and provide for missionaries raising support.

Pray for all of our missionaries who are implementing new strategies to connect with supporters. It can be difficult and discouraging to try to cast vision for a new life overseas when you don't know when the doors will open up—and when going overseas at may look impossible.




#### 5. Look for unprecendented ministry opportunities.

Recent research showed, over a period of a few weeks, an 85% increase in Muslims responding to messages on Facebook. Many missionaries are reaching out, checking on friends, praying and exploring scripture with local friends using technology. Across the world, house churches and traditional churches are connecting online—in some cases more often or more personally than they had before. Praise God!

In closing, let me say thank you for praying for our AZ Network missionaries during this continued season of pandemic. Let's also pray for believers worldwide to persevere and grow in their faith as well as share it with others. Closed borders, canceled meetings and events, lockdowns and quarantines can't stop the spread of God's Word.

### MY HEALTH MATTERS!


For several years now the A/G's Influence and Enrichment magazines have placed an emphasis on the mental and emotional health of pastors. Now, our movement has established the AG Mental Health Committee. What a need!

Sure, I have an unusual propensity among most pastors; I have absolutely loved pastoral counseling since my early days as a youth pastor at Phoenix First Assembly. Ten years ago, in my opening months at Central Assembly, my admin asked me one day, "Do you always meet with this many people in a given week?" I smiled and answered simply, "Yes." For me, pastoral counseling is a form of discipleship. Crosby references it as a form of sanctification. I have celebrated it as helping people move from where they are to where God wants them to be, and often the struggles are in their minds and emotions and relationships. I have found one-on-one meetings to greatly add to the other ministries our church offers.

I realize this isn't for all pastors. My father loathed counseling in his ministry, something we often laugh together about. Yet, as Crosby states, "Counseling is not some option for the weak, but a strong resource for the wise." He is reaching out to pastors on two counts: for their church members and for themselves. I want to do the same in our great ministry network...

DEAR FRIEND, I PRAY THAT YOU MAY ENJOY GOOD HEALTH AND THAT ALL MAY GO WELL WITH YOU, EVEN AS YOUR SOUL IS GETTING ALONG WELL. 3 JOHN 2

- 1. Please consider your own emotional and mental well-being. If you are struggling, please do not walk alone. Your health will impact the health of your church (and more importantly your marriage and family.)
- 2. Please consider those same needs in the congregation you serve. Studies reveal 1/3 of all Americans are suffering with anxiety. Depression is rampant in our churches. People love Jesus, yet suffer in these areas.
- 3. Please consider giving a sermon series on related topics. I am finishing up my Masters in Professional Counseling at GCU. Over these past several years of classes, my personal reading time has exploded in awareness of such topics in God's Word! If you are mindful, God will lead you with biblical answers for your flock.
- 4. Please know our network leadership has prioritized your health by providing for you: elders (for confidential meetings on any topic), myself (for the same), and a list of counselors we refer pastors to on a regular basis (for the same). You are not alone in life and ministry! Every Wednesday morning in our network staff's prayer/devotional time, we pray over a small segment of our pastors and churches. By December, every ordained pastor and every network church has been interceded for. Our prayer is that in 2021 you will be healthy and blessed in every way!



God is doing something profound in Arizona churches as they embrace the diversity around them. Instead of racial division, we see churches extending their influence to all nations, tongues, and people. An example of this is in the Yuma region. When considering the city and county demographics of Yuma, Pastor Paula and Kelly Milner of First Assembly of God, and Pastor Gary and Julie Floyd of Foothills Assembly of God saw that over 55% of the population was Hispanic.

With that understanding, Pastor Floyd approached Pastor Andres and Carmina Noris, executive pastors in the Southwest District of the Assemblies of God, to join his team and launch a new church called Iglesia Foothills. It remains a Southwest District affiliated church (the Hispanic district in Arizona), but together these English and Spanish churches are saying to the city, every language group is welcome at Foothills. At the end of May, they will launch the new church and already new Hispanic families are attending Foothills Assembly.

Pastor Milner, also with a heart to reach Yuma, knew a Hispanic home Bible study that had outgrown Pastor Frank and Maria Gutierrez's home. At the first of May, Pastor Milner and Pastor Gutierrez are launching Iglesia First Assembly. These new Hispanic churches will combine their youth and children's ministry with their English counterparts. All four churches believe together they can do more than being separate. In a time of racial tension in America, these Yuma pastors are combining efforts, and stewarding facilities to bring a stronger testimony to their region!

#### FOUR BENEFITS OF GROWING YOUR CHURCH'S DIVERSITY

#### Expand your reach for the Kingdom, and become better in the process.

America is more diverse than ever according to data from the U.S. Census Bureau. Between 2015 and '16, every race and ethnic group grew — with minority populations leading the way. Does your church reflect these trends? Maybe not. After all, people usually gravitate toward those who are more like them. But there are some advantages to increasing the diversity of your church. Not only is it a mandate from God to include all people in His calling (Matthew 28:18-20), but it will also make your church better. Below are four ways growing in diversity will benefit your church.

#### 1. MORE TALENT, SKILLS AND GIFTS

More diverse people will bring a greater variety of gifts. It's just a fact. When you include people from different cultural backgrounds, you open your talent pool to musicians who have studied different styles, to speakers with different emphases, and to leaders who have faced different challenges. Diverse congregations are much more creative. They know what it takes to cast a wide net because there is more representation within their midst. If you want to increase your creativity, make sure you are increasing your diversity.

#### 2. MORE OPEN DOORS

The world is coming to America's doorstep. When your church is more diverse, those who are visiting, immigrating or just working in the country for a while will be more comfort-able coming inside. That means a wider front door. You should always be looking for ways to increase the number and type of disciples your church is making. That means reaching out to people from different cultural backgrounds, ethnicities, races, socioeconomic levels, and age groups. The better represented each group is in your church, the better equipped you will be to attract even more.

#### 3. MORE SENSITIVITY TO GOD'S HEART

God created human beings in His own image. From Adam and Eve sprang all the people of the earth — with our various races, languages, personalities, passions and perspectives. The more diverse your church is, the more clearly you can see God's image on display. That will also increase the sensitivity of your heart for God's people. You begin to see them not as demographics, but as precious souls in need of a Savior. And there's no better way to view another person than that.

#### 4. MORE HELPFUL PERSPECTIVES

By having a more diverse church and staff, you will have a wider perspective to see the problems of your community and the needs in your world. It will take intentionally listening to those perspectives. But when you do, your church will be better off for it. Though you may not realize it, failing to interact with people who are different from you limits your ability to communicate, lead and evangelize. Prayerfully broadening your scope will increase your capacity to disciple all kinds of people, meet their needs, and help them apply God's Word to their lives.

Growing in diversity takes intentional effort, but the advantages are well worth the in-vestment. God has placed you in your community for a reason. Take steps to bring into your congregation the diversity you see outside the church walls.

If you are wanting to embrace the diversity around you, please let us know. We have Filipino, African and Spanish churches not only looking for a place to meet, but want to join hands with another church to reach people for Jesus.
