

In 2011, One Church was recognized as the 'New Church Plant of the Year' by Church Multiplication Network. Passing the Baton

"Leadership is more like a baton than a trophy. You keep a trophy, but you hand off a baton." - Bruce Miller

It has happened during the past several Summer Olympics and it will probably happen in the next one as well. In the 4×100 relay, it's not only about how well you run your portion of the race, but also about successfully handing off the baton to the next runner. If you drop the baton during the handoff, it doesn't matter how well you ran your race. It's very simple. If you drop the baton, you are disqualified.

A relay race requires full participation from every member. Everyone giving it their all for their assigned section and then passing on the baton. It's never the fastest runner or the last runner that wins the race. It's the team that works together and trusts each other.

This is especially true in missions and world evangelism. Fruitful decades of soul-winning, discipleship, church planting and ministry training can be attributed not only to teamwork and comradery, but to the careful and confident passing of the baton. We see this throughout the Bible in the following examples: Moses to Joshua, David to Solomon, Elijah to Elisha, Jesus to His disciples, and Paul to Timothy. For men and women of the faith, it's not enough to run the race. We also must pass our mission to the next generation. We must hand off the baton, at the right time, and we must do it well.



Currently, the Assemblies of God World Missions Executive Leadership is in the process of effectively passing of the baton and they are doing it well. It has been my privilege as District Missions Director to serve under Greg Mundis, AGWM Executive Director (2011-2023).

Greg and Sandie have led the AGWM family with great love, sacrifice and service, and the "world missions" baton has been competently held in their hands as they faithfully ran their leg of the race. The Lord has now led them to step away from their role as executive directors and begin a new season in their lives and we wish them the very best, God's best.

Now for the all-important exchange! In Columbus, Ohio at General Council last month, we had the privilege of prayerfully selecting the next AGWM Executive Director. With the confirmation of the Holy Spirit, we witnessed this leadership baton exchange. Allow me to introduce John & Cheryl Easter:

- In 2011, John was appointed as a strategic leader with AGWM Africa and Executive Director of Africa's Hope. This organization supports educational initiatives in 46 African nations through more than 380 schools equipping over 23,000 students annually. John also served as Executive Director of the Association for Pentecostal Theological Education in Africa.
- John earned an M.A.B.S. from Reformed Theological Seminary and a Ph.D. from Assemblies of God Theological Seminary.
- John and Cheryl have three sons: Kevin, John-John, and Mitchell. Mitchell and his wife,
 Alyssa, have four children.

Network family, we are excited and anticipating great things ahead in the area of world missions and know you will join us in prayer as John steps into the role of AGWM Executive Director in October 2023.

Assistant Superintendent



A healthy church creates an atmosphere of worship - where members are free to express their love for God and encounter His presence. Worship is focused on God and not on performance or entertainment. It is always a joy to visit many of the churches in our Network and experience the diversity of worship styles. There are some areas of worship that I believe help us in creating a great worship experience:

Authenticity: Encourage everyone to express their love for God genuinely and authentically. Worship is not a performance, and people are free to be themselves when worshiping. This authenticity fosters a deeper connection with God and with one another.

Encounter with God's Presence: Worship should be a time when our congregation can encounter the presence of God. This might involve moments of deep spiritual reflection, a sense of God's peace, or feeling a strong connection with God. Encounters with God's presence can be transformative and spiritually nourishing.

Teaching and Understanding: A worshipful atmosphere can be enhanced by teaching and understanding. When our people have a solid understanding of the biblical foundations of worship, it can deepen their engagement and appreciation for the worship experience.





Service and Outreach: True worship extends beyond the church walls. A healthy church also engages in acts of service and outreach to the community, demonstrating God's love in tangible ways. This sense of mission and purpose can also enrich the worship experience.

A worshipful atmosphere in a healthy church is usually characterized by a deep, genuine focus on God, authenticity in worship, freedom of expression, encounters with God's presence and a commitment to service and outreach. It's a space where individuals can connect with God in a meaningful and transformative way, free from distractions and self-focus.

Creating a worshipful atmosphere in a church requires intentional efforts from both the leadership and the congregation. Here are some practical steps to help establish and maintain a worshipful atmosphere:

Seeking God's Guidance:

Begin by seeking God's guidance through prayer. Ask for wisdom and insight on how to create a worshipful atmosphere specific to your church's unique context.

Teaching and Understanding:

Educate the congregation about the importance and biblical foundations of worship. Regularly offer teachings on worship to deepen their understanding.

Diverse worship styles:

Be open to diverse worship styles that resonate with your congregation's cultural and spiritual backgrounds. Many of our Network churches have a focus on being intercultural and adjust the worship styles and languages to accommodate the diversity.





Remember that creating a worshipful atmosphere is an ongoing process that may evolve over time. It requires a collective effort from the church leadership, worship team, and congregation to cultivate an environment where members can truly encounter God's presence and express their love for Him authentically.





For we are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do. Ephesians 2:10

In a recent Zoom call with pastors, we were wrapping up a closing chapter to Craig Groeschel's book, "Lead Like IT Matters." Groeschel was stressing the importance of us being centered as leaders and put forth three behaviors that reveal us as being off-centered:

- · Annoyingly insecure
- · Consistently unpredictable
- · Distastefully self-absorbed

He went on to offer three traits then, of a centered leader:

- Inwardly confident
- · Strategically consistent
- · Mission driven

It is so important as leaders that we do self-evaluation on such matters and these types of discussions can be painfully productive for us! I am thankful for the many pastors willing to hang out and discuss such things in our Pastors' Zoom calls. Interestingly enough, when both groups (about 20 pastors) opened up on which of the three areas they are most prone to struggle in, virtually every pastor first cited "annoyingly insecure" and the need to be more "inwardly confident."

That moment has stuck with me. What is it within us all that if we are honest with ourselves and other leaders, insecurity runs in all of our veins? It is comforting to think that the likes of Moses, Gideon, and Jeremiah overtly illustrate this reality among some of the greats of Scripture. Again, what is it about us humans that we tend to struggle so much with insecurity?

This is too great a subject to unpack in a brief blog. I would say the heart of the matter is that word "human." It is inherent to our humanness that we lack confidence in ourselves. And thankfully Groeschel immediately turned us to the answer as he asserts our confidence must originate not from ourselves, but from a confidence in God! When we embrace His creation of us, His calling upon our lives, His promises, His faithfulness, His Spirit's presence, His love, etc. that is when we find the much needed confidence we require to do His work!

I'd encourage you to pick up Groeschel's book as a good fall read and why not join us in our next Zoom call sessions when they open up again. Such self-reflection is vital to our health.






